THE NICENE CREED

Calling the Sinners

'Jesus answered them, "It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick. I have not come to call the righteous but the sinners to repentance" (Luke 5:31-32)

Jesus was often criticised by the morally righteous for eating with 'tax collectors and sinners', in other words people that they looked down upon because of their sinful lifestyle. But Jesus had come precisely for the ones who needed him and so he gladly mixed with the sinners and taught them the gospel of forgiveness. As part of his call, he summoned them to repentance, for we are forgiven when we turn to the Lord and commit our lives to him. This is modelled by Levi, who abandoned tax collecting, through which he was exploiting other people for gain, to follow Jesus (see Luke 5:27-28). Of course, the morally upright need to repent also, but they are the ones who often find it hardest

Question for thought:

Who does Jesus call upon to repent?



First woman appointed to be the next Archbishop of Canterbury

The Bishop of London, the Right Reverend and Right Honourable Sarah Mullally, has been announced as the next Primate of All England

The Bishop of London, the Rt Revd Sarah Mullally, is to be the next Archbishop of Canterbury

THE next Archbishop of Canterbury is to be the Rt Revd Sarah Mullally, the Bishop of London since 2018, Downing Street announced on Friday. She is to be the first woman to hold the post.

The nomination of the next Primate of All England was agreed by at least a twothirds majority of the 17 voting members of the Canterbury Crown Nominations Commission (CNC), who held their final meeting last week. A shortlist had been agreed at their previous meeting in August (News, 8 August).

Bishop Mullally, who is 63, succeeds the Rt Revd Justin Welby, who resigned in November after the publication of the Makin report on the Church's handling of the abuse perpetrated by John Smyth (News, 15 November 2024). The CNC convened six months later, at the end of May.

Before ordination, Bishop Mullally trained and worked as a nurse in London, becoming a senior civil servant in the Department of Health. She was the youngest ever Chief Nursing Officer, holding that appointment from 1999 to 2004. She was ordained in 2001 and served as a self-supporting minister until 2006 in Battersea, south London.

She went on to be Team Rector of Sutton, in Southwark diocese, before being appointed Canon Treasurer of Salisbury Cathedral in 2012. She was elevated to the episcopate in 2015, as Bishop of Crediton in the diocese of Exeter. She was appointed Bishop of London just two years later (News, 17 December 2017).

While Bishop of Crediton, she was asked to lead on the implementation of recommendations set out in the Elliott review, which called for sweeping changes to the Church's safeguarding procedures (News, 27 May 2016). She has been an advocate for survivors of abuse in a church context.

Bishop Mullally is Dean of the Chapels Royal and speaks regularly in the House of Lords on issues including migration, child well-being, and health and social care. She has been outspoken against the assisted-dying Bill currently being considered by the Lords (News, 19 September). For three years, she led the Church's workstream on sexuality, Living in Love and Faith.

Bishop Mullally is married to a business architect and has two adult children.


The CNC was chaired by Lord Evans, a former head of MI5 and a crossbench peer. In an interview earlier this year, he described the process as one of "discernment" rather than straightforward "selection".

In addition to Lord Evans, the voting members were: the Archbishop of York, and the Bishop of Norwich, the Rt Revd Graham Usher, representing the Northern and Southern Provinces; and six members elected from the General Synod, five from the Anglican Communion, and three from the diocese of Canterbury.

Processes that follow the announcement include the election of the Archbishop-designate by the College of Canons of Canterbury Cathedral, followed by a Confirmation of Election in January, when the Archbishop-elect legally becomes the Archbishop of Canterbury. After this, the Archbishop will pay homage to the King before being installed in the Chair of St Augustine at Canterbury Cathedral.



Praying with St Benedict Workshop

Friday 14th & Saturday 15th November 10am — 3.30pm both days. (Refreshments from 9.30am)

Led by Mother Anne Clarke OSB, Abbess of Malling Abbey, UK.

The Rule of Saint Benedict lays out a pattern of life that integrates mind, body and spirit so that we may engage our whole being to 'pray without ceasing'. It continues to inspire people today and provides much wisdom to guide us as we seek to live God-centred lives in our distracted and media-soaked society.

In these two workshops we will explore the ways early Christians prayed, how they laid the foundations for Benedict's monastic life and what all this might mean for us today. These will be practical rather than scholarly workshops with reflections from Mother Anne along with opportunity for discussion, individual reflection and participation in prayer exercises inspired by the practices of early Christians and the Rule of St Benedict.

Workshop 1: 'Pray without ceasing' [1 Thess 5:17] — early Christian approaches to fulfilling St Paul's teaching.

Workshop 2: Prayer in the Rule of St Benedict – how the Rule can guide us toward living lives infused with the presence of God.


Each workshop will be complete in itself but taken together will give a deeper understanding of prayer and the Rule of St Benedict.

Mother Anne OSB has a PhD in computer science from Cambridge University, UK, and worked for 25 years in the hi-tech world of 'Silicon Fen' (as the area around Cambridge has come to be known). She was involved in early experiments with social media but became disillusioned with the idea that more technology was always a good thing. This led to training in massage therapy and exploration of the relationship between body and prayer. Eventually she followed God's call to live a life of prayer, entering the Benedictine monastic community of Malling Abbey in the UK in 2009.
